## LÀGOSTA, MELEDA, CANNOSA

LAGOSTA (the AástoBov of Constantine) lies about eight miles due south of Curzola. It is not likely that the traveller will visit this "remote Bermuda" of the Dalmatian archipelago; it offers no architectural attractions, its flora is much like that of its neighbours, Lesina, Lissa and Curzola. The island is rich in carobian beans, the Johannisbrotbaum of the Germans, because St. John's food was "locust and wild honey". But how did it get the name "locust"? Did the island give its name to the bean? Does the English word "locust = the carobian bean" come from Làgosta? However that may be, the Lago grande is full of fish and of écrevisses, and the population of about 1200 inhabitants is almost entirely devoted to fishing. But they were not always thus peacefully employed. Lagosta swims into history as one of the
